




Term Inmate Flow

- Inmates receiving ‘term sentences’ are sent to prison for the fixed (determinate) portion of the sentence.
- They are eligible for parole when they complete the first portion and reach the indeterminate portion of their sentence.
- Example: A 2-5 year sentence includes 2 years of fixed time in prison and 3 years of indeterminate time on parole or in prison.




Inmates who receive parole dates have usually:

- Completed programs
- Taken responsibility for their crime

Retained Jurisdiction Inmate Flow

- Judges retain jurisdiction of offenders in the retained jurisdiction (rider) program while they receive treatment for up to 180 days.
 - Effective June 15, the Correctional Alternative Placement Program will offer a 90-day treatment option under this statute.
 - IDOC proposes a 270-day Therapeutic Community treatment option under the same statute.



The majority of retained jurisdiction offenders are released to probation and successfully complete probation.

Parole Violators

- This group of inmates are on parole, but in prison
- The parole commission decides if they will return to parole or be sent to prison for the rest of their sentence.
