PER CURIAM

Chance P. James was found guilty of trafficking in heroin, Idaho Code § 37-2732B(a)(6)(A), and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia, I.C. § 37-2734A. The district court imposed a three-year determinate term for trafficking and a concurrent sentence of one day in jail for the misdemeanor, with credit for time served. James appeals, contending that his trafficking sentence is excessive.

Sentencing is a matter for the trial court's discretion. Both our standard of review and the factors to be considered in evaluating the reasonableness of the sentence are well established and need not be repeated here. *See State v. Hernandez*, 121 Idaho 114, 117-18, 822 P.2d 1011, 1014-

15 (Ct. App. 1991); *State v. Lopez*, 106 Idaho 447, 449-51, 680 P.2d 869, 871-73 (Ct. App. 1984); *State v. Toohill*, 103 Idaho 565, 568, 650 P.2d 707, 710 (Ct. App. 1982). When reviewing the length of a sentence, we consider the defendant's entire sentence. *State v. Oliver*, 144 Idaho 722, 726, 170 P.3d 387, 391 (2007).

Applying these standards, and having reviewed the record in this case, we cannot say that the district court abused its discretion. Therefore, James's judgment of conviction and sentence are affirmed.
